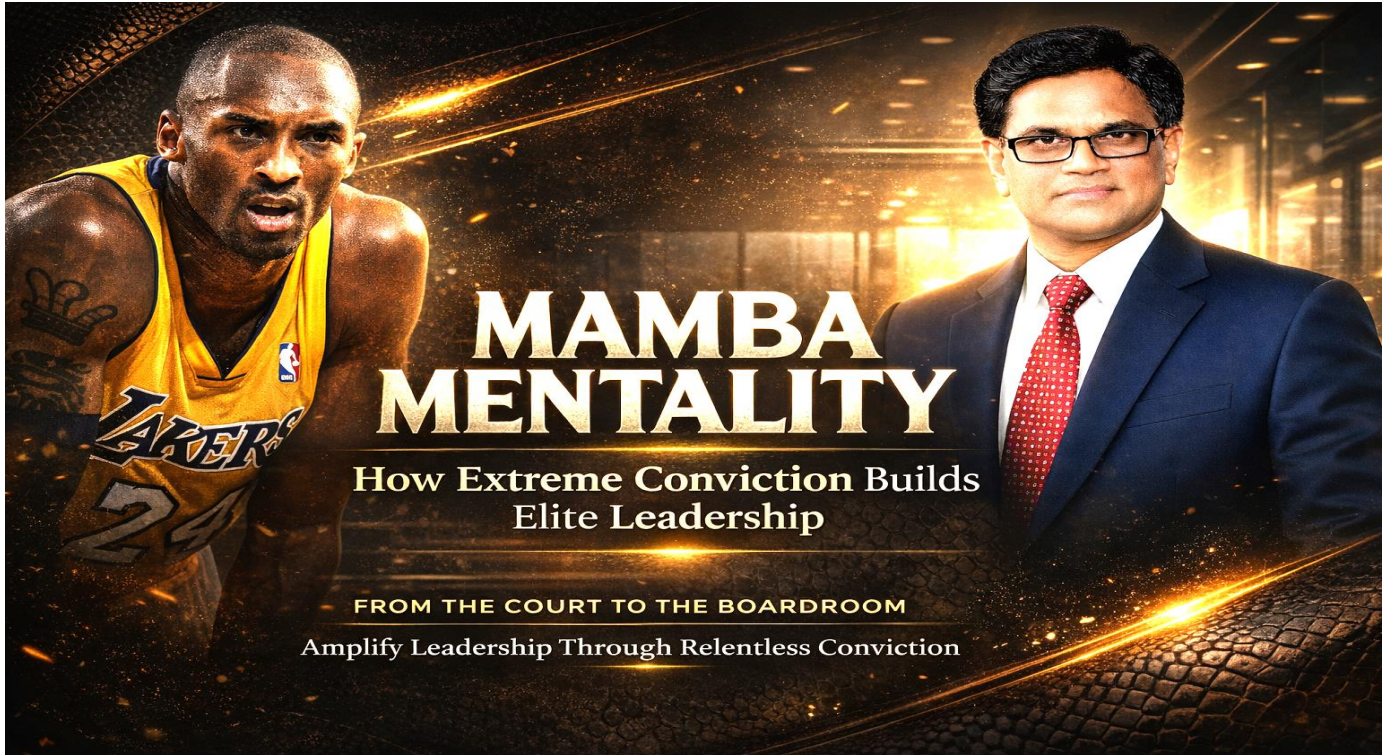


# MAMBA MENTALITY
